# INTERNATIONAL BACCALAUREATE UPDATE FROM CHIEF SEALTH

The Windermere Foundation awarded a \$2,500 grant to the IB program at Chief Sealth High School to support teacher training. Thanks to their generous gift and community support, we were able to train an additional 13 teachers, above and beyond the 10 that have already received training.

This means that 9th and 10th grade teachers received training as well, so they will be able to integrate IB teaching methodology and approaches into their classes to improve student preparedness.

Seattle School Board director, Irene Stewart, wrote "This training benefits every student at Sealth, not just the first IB class. It's also exciting to see Sealth High School and Denny Middle School align their programs and teaching practices. Both schools are really on the move, offering more opportunities to our students and families than ever before. We appreciate the support received from throughout the West Seattle community, and especially families in Fauntleroy – you made this happen!"

**Big news!!** The current freshman will be the first IB Diploma Class! There is a great deal of excitement amongst the 9th grade students and their families. The 58 students who joined the IB club will be visiting an IB school soon and attending internationally focused events this spring.

The application process is moving ahead splendidly with the school on track to submit their application June 1st. That means that next fall or early winter the IB Organization will come and perform a site visit at Chief Sealth as part of the school accreditation process. The timing will allow for current freshman to take IB authorized courses in their junior year. ## FROM THE WATERSHED COUNCIL VOLUNTEERS MONITORING SALMON TO SOUND

For the fourth year, volunteers are monitoring the number and size of coho smolts leaving Fauntleroy Creek for Puget Sound. These fish have spent a little over a year in freshwater, growing to 4"-5" in length. Once in saltwater, they'll feed nearby until big and strong enough for open water.

Smolt traps are in two locations - one (for the first time) in the upper creek behind Fauntleroy Church and one in the fish ladder. The combination will provide data on how many smolts are migrating out of tributaries in Fauntleroy Park, where the majority of release fish find habitat, and how many survive to reach the lower creek.

Volunteers led by Tom Linde, Steev Ward, and Jack Lawless will monitor these traps daily into May.

# COVE PARK UNDER SIEGE!

The annual spring clean and landscaping at Cove Park has been put on hold due to extensive sewer construction by King County Wastewater Treatment Division (see related story page 7).

The contractor has brought in heavy equipment and is using the park street entrance as a beach access. Temporary pumps are stationed at the top of the park with pipes running out to connections on the beach.

At the insistence of Cove Park advocates and with the cooperation of King County project

managers, precautions have been taken to protect the stream bed artwork, the Native American canoe replica, and the sculptural depiction of the "Raven and the Sun".

# FERRY ADVISORY COMMITTEE

Near the end of the 2006 Legislative session the Senate passed SB6787 that essentially eliminates Washington State Ferries as a passenger only ferry operator. Of particular interest to Fauntleroy and West Seattle is that after streamlining passenger only service for greater efficiency, WSF will not be providing this service in the future.

WSF, currently providing service between Vashon and downtown Seattle, with walk-on transfers from Southworth, had the capability for expanding full service to Southworth with greater capacity that would have the potential of eliminating even more vehicles arriving and departing at the Fauntleroy terminal daily.

The bill requires that WSF dispose of two passenger only vessels currently in storage and deposit the proceeds in a passenger ferry account. The newly established account, which will also be fed with sales tax proceeds paid by WSF on fuel, will be used for capital improvements for passenger ferry projects.

WSF will operate the Vashon service with the remaining two vessels as outlined in the bill until a local government can assume the route or routes.

Local government in this case means Kitsap Transit or METRO of King County. The bill also authorizes counties bordering Puget Sound with a population over one million to establish a ferry district for purposes of operating passenger only service. The ferry district will also have an independent taxing authority.

King and Kitsap Counties have proceeded with studies for ferry service and Kitsap Transit is contracting passenger only service to Seattle from Bremerton. King County, in addition to operating

the West Seattle Water Taxi, is preparing proposals for passenger only service on Lake Washington as well as Puget Sound.

WSF will continue service to Vashon until the level of service, source of funding, and management of operations, King County or private contractor, can be determined. A best guess is that a transition may begin in two to three years.

In other ferry operations affecting West Seattle, WSF has released the long range plan for public feedback in developing the final plan.

Included in the draft plan is rerouting the Southworth auto ferry from Fauntleroy to downtown Seattle by the year 2014. This would have an obvious effect on West Seattle with a greatly reduced number of vehicles in and out of Fauntleroy.

Seattle Department of Transportation however, has notified WSF that the proposed rerouting will not be supported by SDOT. In fact it was publicly stated, in their words, that Fauntleroy is not operating at capacity and can continue to manage Southworth arrivals. The fact that Fauntleroy is at capacity and cannot be expanded is the reason for the WSF proposed rerouting.

The Fauntleroy Ferry Advisory Committee will be participating in any negotiations or dialogue in this matter in an effort to prevent an escalation of a downtown versus neighborhoods conflict. Comments or opinions from neighbors are welcome.



2006 marks the 8<sup>th</sup> season of the popular West Seattle Farmers Market., with over 35 local farmers and food crafters selling an astounding variety of greens, berries, tree fruit, tomatoes, peppers, root vegetables, squashes and other fresh produce, farmstead cheeses, farm bouquets, eggs, honey, cider, artisan breads and pastries, free-range chicken, local pork, beef, and fish. The family farmers who bring their products to this market use sustainable growing methods, including certified organic.

Early harvests include native plants and plant starts, spring greens and salad mixes, and the season's first luscious, local strawberries arriving

soon. The West Seattle Farmers Market accepts food stamps (EBT), WIC and Senior FMNP coupons.

Open every Sunday from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., the market will continue its weekly schedules of cooking demos, music and special activities throughout the season. Master Composters, Master Gardeners, and P-Patch will also be on hand to answer gardening and composting questions.

Upcoming special events include traditional Hawaiian music on May 7, classic country music on May 14 and Scott Walter's original folk/rock tunes on May 21, all from 10 a.m. to noon.

## LINCOLN PARK SEWER PIPE REPAIR UPDATE

King County has completed all pipe construction on an emergency repair project replacing more than a mile of sewer line that runs through Lincoln Park. The 50 year old line was damaged after heavy rains and high flows on January 17 and February 4, causing sewer leaks in Lincoln Park.

Completions to date include installation of a temporary pump station at the Barton pump station site (Fauntleroy Ferry dock); the existing pipeline has been "slip lined" and repaired (a smaller diameter pipe was "slipped" into the existing pipe); and a second pipeline parallel to the existing line was installed between the Barton Pump Station and

the Murray Pump Station across Fauntleroy Cove.

King County is currently testing the new and repaired pipes for leakage. When testing is complete, the county will begin restoration efforts. King County staff will be meeting with affected property owners and the Seattle Parks and Recreation Department to develop the plan for the restoration work. Your continued patience throughout this repair project has been appreciated. The county is working diligently to finish this project and restore the area to better than preconstruction conditions.

## NEIGHBORS GATHER TO DISCUSS NEIGHBORHOOD SAFETY

About 30 neighbors, primarily from the area surrounding the old Fauntleroy Schoolhouse, gathered at the Hall at Fauntleroy on March 29 to discuss common safety concerns and find ways to address them.

Benjamin Kinlow, Seattle Police Department SW precinct Community Crime Prevention Coordinator, spoke about personal, vehicle and neighborhood safety in response to concerns in the area.

Neighbors shared information about crimes and property damage that have occurred in the area over the past few years. They also discussed ways in which they might, as a group, reduce crime.

Attendees formed a contact list to keep each other informed of unusual activity or problems in the area and agreed to form a Block Watch.

The group felt that one of the many benefits of joining forces is to wield greater clout in making requests of the city, such as increased surveillance and traffic monitoring.
