

### Ferry Advisory Committee

Last April Washington State Ferries hosted an open house at the Fauntleroy School when Planning Director Ray Deardorf presented the WSF Draft Long Range Plan for community feedback. The full plan is available at www.wsdot.wa.gov/ferries.

The Final Plan, when approved and funded by the legislature, will implement terminal upgrades, vessel construction, and level of service on Puget Sound.

The portion of the plan that was of most interest to our community is the rerouting of Southworth auto service to downtown Seattle's Colman Dock.

The primary reason for this proposed action is obvious. The Fauntleroy terminal is operating at capacity, and by rule of a Seattle City Council resolution, cannot be expanded. Therefore, without capacity to accommodate population growth and increasing demand from Kitsap County, the choice is to route the service to Colman Dock.

Because of the reconstruction required at Colman, it could be 6 to 8 years before the rerouting would be in effect but when done, it will remove over a half million vehicles from West Seattle annually.

The importance of this potential dramatic reduction is the reason I applied for a position on the Seattle Ferry Terminal Project Citizens Advisory Group, and having been selected as a member of the CAG, my objective is to help ensure that the planned additional slip at the future Colman Dock to accommodate Southworth service will actually be implemented.

Resistance to that objective has appeared and it



is significant resistance at that. In September of

last year, the Director of the Seattle Department of Transportation submitted a letter to Mike Anderson, Director, WSF, stating that SDOT would not support that portion of the Long Range Plan. In addition, in July, a letter from the Mayor's office to Director Anderson requested that Southworth ferry service be maintained at Fauntleroy.

It seems certain that the offices of the Director of SDOT and the Mayor have concerns about an increase in the amount of vehicles downtown in and out of Colman.

However the 1999 WSF Travel Survey shows that over half of the Southworth ridership commutes to or through downtown Seattle daily.

Should WSF be unable to proceed with the planned reroute due to pressures from the City, this will be a lost opportunity of significant proportions to West Seattle.

The opportunity for reducing the amount of vehicles arriving and departing at the Fauntleroy terminal by approximately one third may not occur again. With that in mind, the Fauntleroy Community Association and the Fauntleroy Ferry Advisory Committee would like to invite resident and business communities of West Seattle to support our objective of working with WSF and the City to help achieve a solution of this complex problem.

We encourage anyone with concerns about this issue to contact us for comments, questions, or additional information. Your attention and participation is needed.

#### There And Back Again

Fauntleroy Church recently completed a mission trip to a small town in southern Mexico. We went to help build a new church, replacing an old church that had been damaged by an earthquake a few years back. Our job was to lay the new foundation. This seemed like a straightforward task: fly down, dig a ditch, fly back again. Reality was much more complicated.

After several hours in the air, an overnight in Houston, and a 2 ½ hour bus ride into the mountains surrounding Oaxaca, Mexico, we finally arrived at San Jose Contrares, the town of about 500 where we would be staying. It must have been a curious sight for the town's residents: thirty Americans, speaking a language they did not understand, hauling luggage down a hill to the emptied-out classrooms that would serve as our lodgings.

Following a late dinner on the far side of the valley, we unpacked and settled in for sleep. In the morning it became clear that we had neglected to bring warm clothing and adequate bedding. When packing in Seattle, Mexico had seemed like an extremely hot

place. Who would need sweatshirts and thick sleeping bags? Nighttime temperatures cooled to 50 degrees. Brrrr. The classroom was lined with windows that did not shut and the rain leaked in.

After a superb breakfast and awesome coffee, the day's work began. One group had to literally move a mountain in order to make room for the foundation. The other group collected rocks for that foundation. In the coming days, our tasks would include digging, collecting sand, and even more digging. Soon, we had the materials in place and a trench ready to go.

Unfortunately, we would not see the foundation poured. We left San Jose Contraras tired but very hapy with the new friends and significant progress we made during our stay.

#### FCA Takes Initiative To Address 'Fauntleroy Stench'

In early July, "the stench" began to waft into homes along and near Fauntleroy Cove, prompting the FCA Board, once again, to initiate action with public officials and agencies to restore air quality in the neighborhood.

The noxious odor originates from a lettuce-like seaweed in the cove. As this seaweed decomposes on the beach, it sends off hydrogen sulfide, a colorless, toxic gas that is a health hazard to residents. Also, as it grows, the seaweed depletes oxygen in the water needed by juvenile salmon and other species that feed in the cove.

Working with public officials, FCA was able to get funding in 1990 and 1999-2000 to harvest rotting seaweed from the beach and haul out living seaweed from the water. These actions abruptly restored air quality around the cove. Eventually, though, excess nutrients in the water allowed the seaweed to flourish again, causing gas levels to rise.

The FCA Board asked Judy Pickens with the Fauntleroy Watershed Council to take the lead in seeing what could be done. Contacts with environmental and health agencies confirmed that no one is currently in a position to "own" the problem. Then we looked to public officials.

Judy worked with David Anderson, an air-quality specialist familiar with this and similar episodes around Puget Sound, to write a "white paper" about the stench. We attached that background information to a funding request to public officials, starting with County Councilmember Dow Constantine, with copies to our state representatives and senator.

Many phone calls and e-mails later, I can report to you that both Dow and Senator Erik Paulsen are very much on the case. They've come up dry for any county or state funding for a haul out this year but are strategizing for next year.

As chair of the Senate's Water, Energy, and Environment Committee, Erik is in an ideal position to push for a response from the state. We have emphasized that the most helpful response would include not only haul-out funding for next summer but also a directive to an appropriate state agency to address the broader problem around the Sound.

What You Can Do To Live With The Stench...

Hydrogen sulfide is most often released at low tide on hot days. It can also be released when mats of seaweed are stirred, such as by the ferry backwash.

It is a heavy gas that settles in basements and windless corners of the garden. Documented health problems include throat irritation, headaches, and fatigue. To reduce your exposure,

- close windows and doors during low tide.
- use a fan to blow out the house, especially bedrooms at night.
- delay outdoor activities until the smell wanes.
  Waterfront residents can help by never
  putting yard waste on the beach. Doing so is illegal
  because it adds nutrients and harmful chemicals to
  the cove and Sound.

We are considering adding a community forum, informational-type meeting or workshop to the annual FCA events. ### Future of Fauntleroy School Building In Question

Seattle Public Schools (SPS) recently informed the Fauntleroy Community Service Agency (FCSA), a nonprofit organization that has leased Fauntleroy School for more than two decades, of a potential policy change that could dramatically affect building use and our community. The FCSA leases the building to house Fauntleroy Children's Center, a nationally accredited childcare program serving infants, toddlers, and pre-school aged children as well as elementary students before and after school. Other tenants, including the Hall at Fauntleroy, pay market rate rents that help maintain the building.

The FCSA is designated as a Youth and Family Center under a School Board policy that allows closed buildings to be leased as such at sub-market rates. At the same time, the nonprofit is responsible for all building maintenance and improvements. SPS facilities staff recommends that the School Board change that policy in order to collect more rental income. If the Board approves it, the FCSA would have a very difficult time continuing current use. The future of Fauntleroy Children's Center is at stake as well as a possible change in use of the whole building. The FCA, not to be confused with the FCSA opposes this change, as does West Seattle's School Board director, Irene Stewart. However, the issue is currently before the Board's Finance Committee (directors Michael DeBell, Mary Bass and Sally Soriano). If you would like to support Fauntleroy Children's Center, send e-mail to schoolboard@seattleschools.org. Ask the Superintendent and Board to maintain the current Closed Schools policy and its Youth and Family Center clause, which helps Fauntleroy and programs like it to support learning in and out of school. Highest and best use of school buildings, open or closed, is to support the children, youth and families in our community who own our public schools.
