

FAUNTLEROY SPEAKS UP ON FERRY EXPANSION

The meeting agenda consisted of WSF presenting the progress of this proposal and working with WSF the Long Range Plan for Growth (LRP) to the very closely. The plan also contains the potential for Fauntleroy community for public feedback.

We now know the Plan's proposal to expand the Fauntleroy dock for additional vehicle staging was soundly objected to by the community, and as a result of this strong rebuttal, that portion of the plan was removed. An opportunity for public feedback was provided, and the substantial attendance and testimony was truly a textbook example of a community process at work.

Individual statements were received as insightful and precise. Residents' testimony represented the community in a thoughtful and professional manner, as commented on by David Moseley, Director, WSF. So, I wrote: "Dear Evelyn: How do we recycle frozen juice containers (like Minute Maid OJ) they contain cardboard (maybe coated, which I guess would mean garbage.) Do I rip the metal part off, recycle that and garbage the cardboard?

She replied in about an hour: "Dear Bruce: Actually, if you rip the metal off, you can recycle the cardboard part (please rinse) even if coated. You can recycle the metal lids and bottoms if they are wider than 3" in diameter. Hope that helps! Evelyn"

I wondered about egg cartons: Paper egg cartons can be composted or recycled: Foam ones go in the garbage. Save clean ones to give to farmers who sell eggs at farmer's markets.

This morning I wrote: Dear Evelyn, What do we do with combination cardboard and plastic packaging that comes with electronics, new phones, calculators, smoke detectors and a lot of what we buy today. The paper is 'welded' into the rigid and sharp plastic

FEET FIRST, TRAILS PROJECT TO CREATE A WALKABLE WEST SEATTLE

Feet First is an advocacy organization promoting walkable communities, helping people take simple steps to create better places to live, learn, shop, work, and play - a world that cares about health, community, and design.

Walkable communities need a good network of trails and paths to connect destinations and help neighbors and visitors navigate around. Feet First has been working with communities across the West Seattle Peninsula to identify and develop trail networks. In Fauntleroy, they are taking it a step further by erecting signage to provide wayfinding information through our area.

A wayfinding sign plan for Fauntleroy is at a 90% stage. It has 17 signs and

directs people to the ferry dock area, Endolyne, our version of the map at the Southwest Library branch. parks, libraries, other neighborhoods, and hidden

stairs. Also, we are starting to develop content for the 3 kiosks (Endolyne District, Fauntleroy Ferry Dock, and north end of Lincoln Park). If you would like to help write and design some of the kiosk content, please contact seth@feetfirst.info.
