What defines them as "ecovillages" or "green neighborhoods" is that they encourage local economic development, strong neighbor connections, greenhouse gas reductions of 20 to 40 percent per person, thanks to most amenities and necessities located

within walking distance. They are designed to be compact, livable, mixed-use communities with green spaces, green infrastructure, and green buildings.

The most ambitious program at this point is Portland's -- where public and private partners seek to meet the city's 2050 Climate Action Plan goal of reducing greenhouse gas emissions by 80%. Their eco-district initiative looks at neighborhoods as systems, rather than as collections of separate dwellings, businesses and infrastrucures. It's in line with the architectural evolution from "green building" to "living building" -- going beyond just making the building "green," to making the entire property, its supply systems and surroundings "green." COUNTY 'MAKING GOOD' WITH CLEAN SAND

Dump trucks of sand will be heading to Fauntleroy Cove as King County makes good on a commitment not met in 2008 when the pipe carrying wastewater around to Lowman beach was replaced.

Instead of filling the trench with washed sand, the contractor cut a corner by using sand that contained dirt. Residents north of the ferry terminal found that the trench line turned to mud during the wet season and blowing dust during the dry season. County workers staked the site in mid January so that a thick cap of washed sand can go down in February.

STATUS REPORT: FAUNTLEROY SCHOOL

The Fauntleroy Community Service Agency (FCSA) is in the final stages of procuring the old Fauntleroy School building, surrounding lot, current parking area and about two-thirds of the back playground. They are working on getting additional funding for the rest of the playground but it may be challenging with the current economy.

Joe Cachero is in the process of getting the building advisory board kicked off. George Suyama has volunteered to be on the board from the FCA. We are looking for additional FCA members.

WASTEWATER TREATMENT PROJECTS FOR FAUNTLEROY

Quality wastewater treatment is essential to protect public health and the environment. King County Wastewater Treatment Division currently has two large capital projects in the planning and design phases, both of which will have an effect on YOUR? neighborhood,. The first is the upgrade of the Barton Pump Station, located adjacent to the Fauntleroy Ferry Dock. The current facility is largely underground. It was built in 1959 and is in need of a major remodel. Currently, it pumps 26 million gallons of sewage per day to the county's West Point Treatment Plant in Magnolia. The new facility will have an increased pumping capacity of 33 million gallons per day. Plans are now at 30% design and the county team is expecting to hold a neighborhood meeting in early spring to share the design with the neighbors and gather comments and concerns. The project manager, Sue Hildreth, is leading the project team and will be available to meet with neighborhood groups as requested. She will be also be attending the Fauntleroy Community Association Annual Meeting on March 23rd, and will have plans and conceptual

drawings to share at that time.

The second large wastewater project being planned for the Fauntleroy neighborhood is the Combined Sewer Overflow Beach Project. (CSO) The county has been developing alternatives for controlling the CSO's and will be announcing three alternatives for the Fauntleroy neighborhood at public meeting this spring. а (Watch your mailboxes for a postcard with the details or check www.Fauntleroy.Net.) CSO events occur in older, more established parts of Seattle when storm water enters the sewer system. If volumes exceed system capacity, a combination of storm water and diluted sewage is discharged through outfall pipes to Puget Sound. While this discharge protects wastewater facilities and private and public property from flooding, it poses potential harm to public health and aquatic life. There are three other Seattle neighborhoods involved in this project: Morgan (Murray basin), North Beach and Magnolia. After intensive work to determine how much combined flow will need to be controlled in storm events, the team has identified four approaches for

CSO control in these basins: 1) conveyance, which is sending flows to an existing treatment plant; 2) storage, which is retaining flows during the storm and slowly releasing it for treatment at a treatment plant; 3) on-site treatment and 4) peak flow reduction, which is implementing one or more methods of limiting stormwater flow into the sewer system. At the King County meeting this spring you can hear what alternative approaches will work best for YOUR your community and have an opportunity to ask questions. Each approach has its challenges and its benefits and a single approach may not be suitable for all sites. The project manager for the CSO Project is Shahrzad Namini. She and Sue Hildreth will be at the Fauntleroy Community Association's Annual meeting on March 23.

VISITORS DISCOVER MYSTERY ON CREEK

Dave McCoy, fishing guide with Emerald Water Anglers, happened to visit Fauntleroy Creek for the first time on Nov. 19 when preschoolers from Providence Mount St. Vincent Intergenerational Center were there. Together, they examined the carcass of one of 18 spawners recorded by salmon watchers. Unusual characteristics suggested that the "mystery fish" was a coho-chinook hybrid, whose death was possibly caused by toxic chemicals in saltwater habitat.

MAJOR RENOVATION UNDER WAY

Preliminary work has begun on a \$2.3 million renovation of the entire Fauntleroy Church building, and 2,500-3,000 people who use the building every week will be impacted until the six-month project is finished.

This first major work on the building in 50 years is intended to make both the church and YMCA more welcoming and accessible, create more meeting and program spaces, improve public safety and the efficiency of building systems, and improve the work environment for employees.

Specifics include adding an elevator, enlarging the narthex (area outside the sanctuary) and adding a plaza, creating a "garden room" below the sanctuary for chapel and meeting space, enlarging and reconfiguring church offices, improving the visibility of the YMCA reception desk and church office off a more open lobby, replacing the boiler and upgrading electrical service, and making major life-safety improvements, including a fire sprinkler system.

All church programs are continuing through construction, and YMCA programs have been only minimally curtailed. The parking lots continue to serve all users of the building and parsonage (temporary home for some YMCA programs).

CHURCH FIRE

Neighbors, passers-by, and fire trucks converged on Fauntleroy Church the afternoon of Dec. 20, when a smoldering fire caused some \$25,000 in cosmetic damage to the sanctuary.

As soon as the fire was extinguished, helping hands set up Fellowship Hall for that evening's choir concert. During the week, volunteers and professionals got the sanctuary sufficiently clean and redecorated for three services on Christmas Eve. Responses to the soot and smoke continue.

"I can't tell you how thrilling it has been to have so much support!" said Rev. David Kratz. "The community really rallied around."
